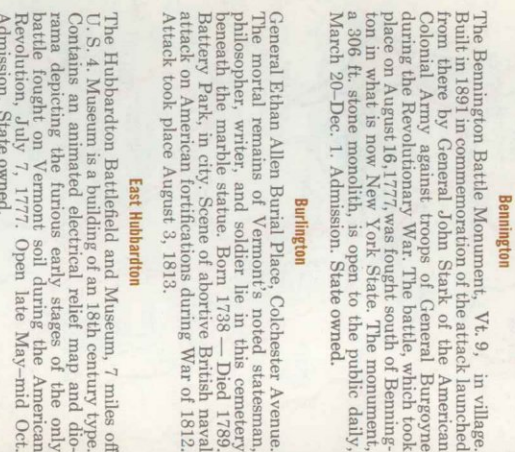
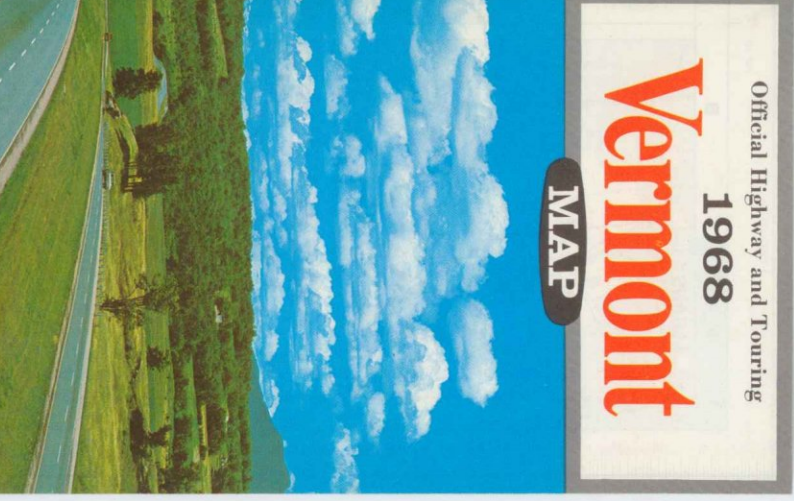

HUNTING REGULATIONS

Deer & Arrow Season: — Begins second Saturday in October 7 a.m. — 6 p.m. D.S.T., for 15 consecutive days (with or without antlers).

Regular Season: — Begins second Saturday in November 6 a.m. — 6 p.m. E.S.T., for 16 consecutive days antlers not less than 5" in length.

**Only 1 deer per person per calendar year. Must report kill within 48 hours.*

Black Bear	— Sept. 1-Nov. 30 incl.
Rabbit	— Oct. 1-Last day of Feb. incl.
Gray Squirrel	— Last Sat. in Sept.-last Thurs. before regular deer season.

Game Birds

Partridge	— Last Sat. in Sept.-last Thurs. before regular season
Quail	— By trapping Oct. 25-Feb. 18
Wild Turkey	— October 1-Oct. 31 incl.

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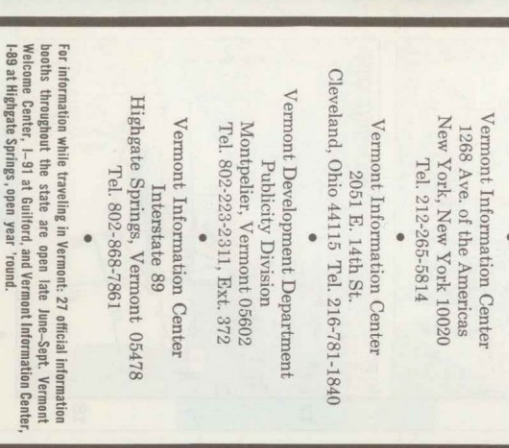
