

DDI in Vermont

Conducting for driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs (DDI) within the State of Vermont can result in court-imposed fines and penalties, including possible jail sentences. Repeated offenses carry even stiffer penalties. Refusal to take a DDI test can also result in license suspension.

Child Safety Seats Required

Vermont law requires that children under one year of age must be secured in a child safety seat. Children between one and five must be secured in a car seat if riding in the front seat and in a car seat or a seat belt if riding in the rear seat. Children aged five through seven must be properly secured in a federally approved safety belt.
